Well, awards season is finally over. Only one of my 'picks' won (though, for me, this is an improvement since I usually strike out completely!), but several were among the best books I have read all year.

My choice for the GG Sweetland, was Michael Crummey. It didn't win, but if you can read only one or two of the nominated books, this should be one. It is excellent. It relates the consequences of yet another government 'resettlement program', this one involving the inhabitants of Newfoundland's out-ports following the crash of the cod industry. The tale centers on Moses Sweetland, an older gentleman who refuses to accept the government's resettlement package. Sadly, the main plot twist was revealed to me one day when, only part way into the book, I heard an interview with the author. I will not do the same to you, but, instead, will say only that the bulk the tale of relates Sweetland's valiant efforts, despite all odds, to remain true to his heart, his heritage, and his memories of a place and culture that ought not to have died.

The Back of the Turtle, by Thomas King, was the winner of the Governor General's Award. While not my first choice, if any book was to have beaten Sweetland for the prize, I am glad this was the one. It is a fine book and I highly recommend it. The story bounces among 5 characters and so can seem a bit disorganized at first, but one quickly gets used to the character shifts, especially as each has a story which adds to the whole. It is a book which is extremely relevant for our times, centering, as it does, on an environmental disaster caused by the inadvertent leak of toxic chemicals. The story relates the effects of this event on the creator of the compound, the people it affected, and the environment it destroyed. Fear not, however, as, far from being as depressing as all that sounds, it is essentially a story of resilience and re-birth. An excellent book which is deserving of any prize and all praise it receives.


Rounding out the prize winners is Us Conductors, by Sean Michaels, recipient of the 2014 Giller. Loosely based on the life of the Russian-born inventor of the theremin (a hands-free musical instrument), it is presented as a retrospective, written by the protagonist while he is


being rather ingloriously shipped back to the Soviet Union following a lengthy stay in the United States. Neither a love story nor a spy thriller, the book incorporates both in the telling of Leon Termen's life. For me, the pacing is uneven. The 'love story' seems unrealistic, slows the narrative and really doesn't add to the plot. The book's 'second theme' -his somewhat inadvertent involvement in the spy industry, his forced return to Russia, and all that befalls him there - makes up for that though, and one puts down the finished novel with a sense of having had a satisfying read.

In summary then, of the various prize nominees and winners, my highest recommendation goes to Sweetland. This followed very closely by The Back of the Turtle. Both are of an order of magnitude better than any of the other books. Of the other winners, Us Conductors falls a distant third and Narrow Road to the Deep North fourth. I will discuss some of the other nominees in future columns.
